# Vote Tuesday, November 6th.

#### Are you eligible to vote?

You are eligible to vote in California if you are:

- ✓ A US citizen
- ✓ A resident of California
- √ 18 years old by Election Day November 6, 2018

The deadline to register to vote for the November 6 Election is October 22. If you miss that deadline, don't worry. You can still register and vote through November 6. Just visit your local county registrar's office. Or if you live in Madera, Napa, Nevada, Sacramento, or San Mateo, you can visit any vote center to register and vote on the same day.

Having a prior felony conviction does not automatically make you ineligible to vote. The only time you cannot vote in California when you have a felony conviction is if:

- You are currently serving a state prison sentence OR
- **X** You are currently on parole.
