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<b>6</b> <b>ELIMINATES RECENT ROAD REPAIR AND TRANSPORTATION FUNDING</b>	Repeals a 2017 transportation funding law which increased state gas tax by 12 cents a gallon. State and local governments would lose \$5.1 billion a year in funding that mainly would have paid for highway and road maintenance and repairs and public transit. <b>7</b> <b>PERMANENT DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME</b>	Gives state lawmakers the ability to adopt permanent daylight saving time with a two-thirds vote. <b>8</b> <b>REGULATES AMOUNTS OUTPATIENT KIDNEY DIALYSIS CLINICS CHARGE FOR DIALYSIS TREATMENT</b>	Limits the amount of money that for-profit dialysis clinics can charge for patient care. Clinics could be required to pay rebates to certain parties (primarily health insurance companies) that pay for dialysis treatment. ## Vote Tuesday, November 6th.

### Are you eligible to vote?

You are eligible to vote in California if you are:

- ✓ *A US citizen*
- ✓ *A resident of California*
- ✓ *18 years old by Election Day - November 6, 2018*

The deadline to register to vote for the November 6 Election is October 22. If you miss that deadline, don't worry. You can still register and vote through November 6. Just visit your local county registrar's office. Or if you live in Madera, Napa, Nevada, Sacramento, or San Mateo, you can visit any vote center to register and vote on the same day.

Having a prior felony conviction does not automatically make you ineligible to vote. The only time you cannot vote in California when you have a felony conviction is if:

- ✗ *You are currently serving a state prison sentence OR*
- ✗ *You are currently on parole.*
